What Are Your Rights?

Everyone living in the U.S has constitutional rights -

You Have the Right to:

Remain Silent

Ask for Identification / Warrant from immigration Enforcement

Document and Record an incident

Deny Entry into Private Spaces (if no warrant)

If You're Stopped While in Public Place by Immigration Agents

- Remain calm
- Ask if you're under arrest or if you can leave
- Ask if they have an arrest warrant
- Remember that you can choose to remain silent - You have the right to say "**I wish to remain silent**"
- You have the right to not share any details related to your immigration status

If you're stopped by Immigration Agents while driving

Stop the car

Safely
& quickly

Show Documents

Driver's license,
registration,
proof of insurance

Search?

If an officer asks to look in your car, you can refuse to consent to the search but if they believe there is evidence of crime, they can search without consent

Right to Remain Silent

Both driver and passengers have the right to remain silent. Passengers also can ask to leave.

What if Immigration Agents Come to My Home?

- You have the right to not open the door. You can talk to them through the door or window.
- You have the right to ask for a warrant signed by a JUDGE. Ask them to show you the warrant either through a window or to slide under the door.
- Make sure your name and address are correct on the warrant.
- If Immigration Agents enter without your consent, you have the right to say “I do not consent.”

What If Immigration Agents Come to My Workplace?

- Immigration agents can enter spaces open to the public such as the seating area in a restaurant, the reception area of a business, nonprofit or government building.
- A private business that is not open to the public requires a judicial warrant for entry.
- Offices or private spaces for employees or clients in a public-accessible building requires a judicial warrant for entry.
- Make sure the company name and address are correct on the warrant and that the warrant is signed by a judge.

The officer executing this warrant, or an officer present during the execution of the warrant, must prepare an inventory as required by law and promptly return this warrant and inventory to United States Magistrate Judge _____

Family Preparedness for Emergencies:

- Name, phone number, and the date of birth of every family member in the household
- A list of allergies, medical conditions and medications of every family member in the household
- Names and phone numbers of schools and workplaces for every family member in the household
- Phone number for the consulate of your country of origin
- Phone number of an immigration attorney or DOJ-Accredited representative who is already aware of your situation
- If you need to travel, check with your immigration attorney or DOJ accredited representative to make sure you have proper documents and travel authorization

Important Documents to Keep Safe and Easily Accessible:

- Valid passport & Identification card
- Birth & marriage certificate
- Alien Number (Also called A-Number) *Try to memorize this number.*
- Immunization card of children
- Social security card
- Caregiver Affidavit of the person willing to care for your child(ren) in case of your sudden absence
- Titles of ownership (home, car, etc.)

What to do if detained by ICE

- You have the right to remain silent. You can say "I wish to remain silent."
- You have the right to only speak to your attorney about your immigration status.
- You have the right to not sign anything unless you understand the document or until you speak to your attorney.
- You have the right to ask for your attorney and to make a phone call. Tell officers "I need to make a call."
- Call your attorney or your family so they can contact your attorney. Tell them your Alien Number (A-Number) so they can locate you.

Locating ICE Detainee

- If you have a family member detained by immigration and you need to locate them, contact the ICE offices:
